Table 1. Gender Breakdown of Authorship for the 2014/15 Theatre Season

- The survey included 219 theatre companies of all shapes, sizes, and geographic regions.
- They produced a total of 668 productions in the 2014/15 theatre season.
- <u>Major Finding:</u> Men continue to dominate (up 1.5% from last year), women did not account for even a quarter of the productions (although up 1% from last year), even though they form 50% of PGC's membership, and mixed partnerships decreased (2.5%).

- Overall, 392 (or 59%) of the productions were Canadian (a 1% increase from last year).
- <u>Major Finding:</u> The numbers for women held steady (dropping .5% from last year), while plays by men witnessed a 5% increase, and mixed collaborations dropped 4.5%.

- <u>Findings:</u> Male playwrights accounted for at least 60% of the productions in all regions; the only exception being the Yukon, which had a perfectly balanced season.
- Some regions (AB, BC, Atlantic Canada, and especially MB) saw the numbers of plays by men increase, while Quebec and Saskatchewan witnessed decreases in the number of plays by men, whereas Ontario remained exactly the same compared to last year.

- Findings: There is a better gender balance with Canadian-authored productions.
- The Yukon produced a gender balanced season, as did Manitoba.
- Otherwise, only in Saskatchewan and Quebec did women surpass the 35% marker.
- The worst offenders this year were Alberta, Atlantic Canada, and British Columbia.

- <u>Findings:</u> Plays by men increased by 1.5%, plays by women were up 1% (same as two years ago), and mixed partnerships sunk 2.5% from the previous season.
- The figures for Canadian women are better: 30% overall (down .5% from last year).
- Still, the statistics indicate regression in recent years for productions by women. Unable to surpass the 35% marker in most cases, women have not yet achieved parity.
