• The survey included 258 theatre companies of all shapes, sizes, and geographic regions.

• They produced a combined total of 1002 productions in the 2018/19 theatre season.

• <u>Major Finding</u>: Productions by men were down 4%; women up 1%; productions by trans and non-binary folks held steady; and mixed partnerships were up 4% from last year.

• Overall, 641 (or 64%) of the productions were Canadian; a 2% increase from last year (following a decrease in the previous year), so we are holding steady on this front.

• <u>Major Finding</u>: Productions by men decreased 5%, shows by women held steady (following an increase last year), mixed gender partnerships were up 4%, and plays by trans and non-binary people remained the same Statistically (added in just last year).

- <u>Findings:</u> Plays by women increased from last year in all regions, with only two exceptions: BC (a 2% decrease) and NB (a 43% drop in works by women, but they had more women than men playwrights the previous year).
- However, plays by men still dominated compared to women (a 50% range vs. 30%).

• <u>Findings</u>: There is a much more equitable gender balance with Canadian-authored productions, as shows by men landed in the 40% range, compared to 30% for women.

• Again, for the first time ever, plays by women were up in all regions with only two exceptions: QC (down 6% from last year) and NB (dropped 25% from the previous year).

• <u>Findings:</u> This year, plays by men decreased; plays by women increased; trans and nonbinary authorship rose (though statistically negligible); as did mixed partnerships.

• Women have finally cracked the 30% marker (and the 35% marker when it comes to Canadian work), so progress is finally being made, though the split is far from equal yet.
